To give yourself the best chance of success, you need to know exactly what the question is asking you to do. Highlight what you think are the key words in the question below (AQA handily does some for you) and then write a definition that explains what they mean to you in this context.

O3 You now need to think about the whole of the source.

How has the writer structured the text to interest you as a reader?

You could write about:

- what the writer focuses your attention on at the beginning;
- how and why the writer changes this focus as the source develops;
- any other structural features that interest you.

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Word	Definition
whole	Ensure you make reference to the way that all parts of the text work together and don't just focus on a single section of it; it can be helpful to identify a beginning, a middle and an end.
how	This command word signals you to comment, explain and analyse; using PEE to structure your own response will help you to do all of this.
structured	Focus on how the author has constructed the text; this also narrows AO2 as the focus of this question is on structure rather than language.
interest	Comment on, explain and analyse the ways in which a text engages readers and elicits a response from them; think about which aspects of the text had an impact or an effect on you and why that was.

The bullet points provide further guidance on constructing your answer. These are liable to change slightly depending on the text but question three will always be on structure and the points above will always stand. The final bullet point intentionally prompts students to demonstrate perceptiveness by bringing in any features that they feel are relevant; though you can comment on structure at punctuation and sentence level, the examiner is really pushing you to consider how the writer has influenced the reader through the sequencing of paragraphs and the flow of ideas and concepts.
