Assessment  Students will be assessed on accuracy of pitch, rhythm,	Students will perform the melody for 'Perfect' by Ed Sheeran on Guitar  Key Words  - Fretboard – Part of the neck of a guitar embedded with frets to change pitch  - Strumming - A strum or stroke is a sweeping action where a finger or plectrum brushes over several strings to generate sound.  - Plucking - Plucking is a way of pulling and releasing the string in such a way as to give it an impulse that causes the string to vibrate  - Chord - 3 notes played at the same time  - Tablature - system of musical notation based on a player's finger position, as opposed to notes showing rhythm and pitch.

Common in electronic and House music.  - Synthesizer (Synth) - An electronic instrument that produces a wide range of sounds, often used for chords, leads, and effects in House music.  - Bassline - A low-pitched repeated pattern that supports the harmony and drives the rhythm in House tracks.  - Breakdown - A quieter section of a House track where instruments drop out, building tension before the music builds back up to a drop.  - Tempo - The speed of the music, measured in beats per minute (BPM). House music typically has a tempo of 120–130 BPM. #### **Key Words**

- Walking Bassline steady sequence of notes, usually played in crotchets, that "walk" up and down the scale, outlining the chord progression and keeping a strong rhythmic pulse

#### How to compose in the style of Rock n roll music

- Choosing stylistic instrumentation
- Creating a 12-bar blues using primary chords in a major key signature
- Creating a walking bassline in the correct key signature
- Creating a melody/motif using the Blues scale and blue note
- Creating a stylistic drum beat in the style of 1950's Rock n Roll
- Creating a verse chorus structure

<u>Assessment – Students will be assessed on the stylistic accuracy of their Rock N Roll composition</u>

- Swing Rhythm is a rhythmic feel where notes that are written evenly (usually eighth notes) are played with a "long-short" pattern.
- Syncopation Irregular Flow of rhythm
- Improvisation Making a part up
